CA Governor Names St. Joseph’s Center CEO to Statewide Homeless Committee



This newly created committee consists of 15 members, including representatives from State agencies as well as gubernatorial and legislative appointees. Dr. Adams Kellum and her fellow committee members will assist and advise the California Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD) on the implementation of the *No Place Like Home Program*, review and make recommendations on the department’s guidelines, review HCD’s progress in distributing funds, and provide advice and guidance more broadly on statewide homelessness issues.

The *No Place Like Home Program* dedicates \$2 billion in bond proceeds to invest in the development of permanent supportive housing for persons who are in need of mental health services and are experiencing homelessness, chronic homelessness or who are at risk of chronic homelessness.

St. Joseph Center is a non-profit social service agency that helps more than 6,500 working poor and homeless persons annually, primarily on the Westside and in South Los Angeles. The Center focuses its work in the areas of Outreach & Engagement, Housing, Mental Health and Education & Vocational services. The Center was founded by two Sisters of St. Joseph of Carondelet. ❖

The fifth session of the Log Cabin Chronicles is now available for viewing on YouTube!



The First Sunday of Lent



On Ash Wednesday we were smudged with the dust of ashes. On Sunday we will be reminded in Genesis that we are clay. Then the psalmist begs God for a clean heart. In the gospel Jesus goes out into the desert, a dry dusty place of little moisture or relief for forty days. Among all the dust, ash and soil I wonder if I am to take the broom and dustpan to my life! The first answer may be yes, but the gospel challenges us all to go deeper.

As we reflect on this Sunday's gospel, we see Jesus going deep. He lets go of much by his sojourn into the desert. He eats less, walks more, is attentive to the silence, tangles with his demons, listens to the Father who reminds him that he is the beloved son, and allows the loving Father's message to win out.

The second answer—let us go deep—reminds us of God's call to return, repent and believe that we are also beloved daughters, beloved sons. As we tangle with our demons during the season of Lent let us fully allow God to call us THE BELOVED. ❖
